RIVERSIDE COUNTY ANNOUNCES A SECOND WEST NILE VIRUS RELATED DEATH

(Riverside County) – According to the Riverside County’s Health Officer, Doctor Gary Feldman, a 72-year old male is the second person in Riverside County to die after being diagnosed with West Nile virus (WNV). The individual had a number of other serious health problems that may have weakened his immune system.

“We all must take West Nile virus infection very seriously and do everything we can to control mosquitoes and reduce our chances of being bitten by mosquitoes,” stated Feldman.

Recommended precautions include:

- Eliminating standing water from your property to reduce mosquito breeding
- Using insect repellent containing DEET or other products such as picaridin, always following label directions
- Making sure your window and door screens are in good condition
- Limiting outdoor activity at dawn and dusk, when mosquitoes are most active
- Wearing long-sleeved shirts and long pants when outdoors

Thirty-one human cases have been reported in Riverside County as of August 17, 2005, compared to 36 for the same time period last year. Most people who become infected with West Nile virus do not experience symptoms or become ill. As many as 20% of those with WNV infection may experience mild to moderate symptoms and about one in every 150 people infected will experience the most serious complications. Anyone who develops symptoms such as a high fever, confusion, muscle weakness, severe headaches or stiff neck, should seek medical care immediately. Adults over 50 years of age are at an increased risk of serious complications from WNV infection.

Residents should contact the local mosquito and vector control agency if there is a significant mosquito problem where they live or work.
